OFFICE OF THE PROVOST

AUP'S GLOBAL LIBERAL ARTS CORE CURRICULUM: We are very pleased to announce a successful initial launch of the first phase of our Global Liberal Arts Core Curriculum (GLACC). The first phase is a soft launch of the new Integrative Inquiry requirement, which replaces the prior Comparing and Mapping Worlds requirements.

The full GLACC program launches fall 2020. This requires each department to insure the inclusion of the Disciplinary Research Methods/Writing requirement and a Capstone requirement for each major. To ensure accurate publications of majors for the next recruitment cycle and to allow for Curriculum Committee review, the deadline for this work is late November. The GLACC Committee will continue its work on both the Digital Literacy and Experiential Learning framework and implementation.

We have devised new course coding for the various requirements, switching from the prior "GE" or General Education coding to a "CC" or Core Curriculum coding. A summary of the coding and requirements is as follows:

It should not be used for faculty meetings with individual students, etc. That said, if you have someone to meet with and find the room available, please feel free to use it, but be aware that others may come in as it is not a private meeting room. We hope to have badge entry installed.

CENTER FOR ACADEMIC, CAREER AND EXPERIENTIAL ADVISING

STAFF CHANGES: The Center has had a number of staff changes over the summer. Marisa Bachetti joined the team in August as an Administrative Assistant during Darcee Caron and Danielle Savage's leaves of absence. Marisa works closely with the Internships and Careers teams, taking on administrative and communications responsibilities and serves as a first point of contact for students seeking assistance. Along with her role in Academic Advising, Isabella Archer is also working with the Careers Office, supporting students in both their academic and professional projects. ACADEMIC ADVISING: Academic Advising trained colleagues from the Admissions and the Registrar’s Office on Transfer Credit Evaluations, and updated our Transfer Credit Evaluation Handbook and Transfer Student intake processes. These initiatives streamlined these processes, fostered collaboration, and shared knowledge across Academic Advising, Admissions, and the Registrar’s Office.

LIBRARY

WELCOME BACK TO AUP: The Library got actively involved in the Orientation tours, and more precisely in the *Learning Commons Know your Tools* for visiting, transfer and partner students. We believed that collaboration among the LC units contributed a better understanding of what our LC is. We want to thank all our LC colleagues who helped with their positive attitude and explanations. As for the FirstBridge experience, librarians will be working with the FirstBridge faculty and students on information literacy throughout the semester.

FACULTY: The Library invites all faculty, especially new faculty, to meet with one of the four librarians who will explain to you the key services for faculty (acquisitions of books, eBooks & films for your classes, reserves, interlibrary loan & document delivery, library instruction during your courses, visiting other libraries in Paris with your classes, brush up with online resources, among others). The Library also invites faculty to visit its [Faculty page](#) on the library web site and suggest additions or changes to better serve you.

NEW LIBRARY MANAGEMENT SYSTEM: The Library, in tight collaboration with the ITS Department, has undertaken a six-month project of changing what we consider the library's ERP. Our campus selected two ExLibris products: Alma (for the back office and technical operations) and Primo (for the discovery of our collections and user experience). We want to extend our special thanks to Ali Rahimi for the negotiations phase, and more recently to Pierre-Yves Vasener, Laurence Amoureux and Sally Murray for their long hours of very hard work during this past summer and the fall ahead of us. The project is expected to go live in January 2020. We will be informing you of the progress in the coming newsletters.

OFFICE OF EDUCATIONAL ASSESSMENT AND INSTITUTIONAL RESEARCH

MIDDLE STATES SELF-STUDY: On the 1st of September, the members of the steering committee completed the 2nd draft of the self-study report for our MSCHE reaccreditation process. The 2nd draft includes the feedback from the external consultants from the CUNY Assessment Offices, as well as comments received from the AUP faculty and staff over the Summer. We are now making some final additions to the report, updating the evidence inventory, minimizing redundancies, and editing the report to give a consistent format and style. We expect to have a second draft finalized by mid-October, two weeks ahead of the arrival of the MSCHE visiting team chair, Dr. Richard Hodges, President of the American University of Rome, scheduled for the 5th November 2019. The next important deadlines for the MSCHE reaccreditation process are:

5th November 2019: Campus visit of Dr. Richard Hodges, chair of the MSCHE visiting team.

31st January 2020: Self-study report is due together with all evidence material.

15th to 18th March 2020: MSCHE visiting team is on campus. All department chairs, committee chairs, and steering committee members should be available on campus. Departments should discuss common strategies for the visits.

June 2020: MSCHE will release their final report on our reaccreditation status.

LIBRARY OF CONGRESS RESEARCH INITIATIVE: In July, David Tresilian led one of the three GLAA research groups selected this year to Washington D.C. With two AUP students, Habiba Nadim and Anabel Bachour, they investigated the theme, “Coming to America: The Early Arab-American Generations”. David and his students will be presenting their work this semester – the date will be announced soon.

AMICAL CONSORTIUM

AMICAL 2020 CONFERENCE: Between Round 1 in July and Round 2 in September, over 60 session proposals were received from across the consortium for [AMICAL 2020](#), our 17th annual meeting and conference which will be held 15-18 January 2020 at the American University of Kuwait. Alex Armstrong, AMICAL’s Program & Technology Officer, has been coordinating the development of the program, with help from a Program Committee composed of a dozen librarians, technologists and faculty from across the consortium, including Jeff Gima (AMICAL Director) and Michael Stoepel (User Services Librarian) from AUP. The theme of the conference is “Digital transformation at international liberal arts institutions: Innovation, collaboration & sustainability,” and registration will be announced in early October.

INFORMATION LITERACY ONLINE EVENTS: From May through September, various members of AMICAL’s Information Literacy Initiatives Committee (chaired by Michael Stoepel) organized four online videoconference discussions for colleagues across the consortium interested in information literacy. Three Journal Club discussions were organized, each focusing on a different recent scholarly article about information literacy, and one peer practices Virtual Forum was organized on the topic of “IL lesson plans: Weapons of mass instruction.”

SMALL GRANTS: In June, AMICAL awarded €15,000 for six [Small Grants](#) at five member institutions. Among these, Michael Stoepel of the AUP Library received partial support to participate in a faculty-student research program organized by the Great Lakes Colleges Association and the Library of Congress, including a site visit to the latter this past July with faculty member David Tresilian and AUP students. The Small Grants program funds training, staff exchanges and projects that support AMICAL’s mission, in particular in the following priority areas: library or technology leadership, information or digital literacies, and digital liberal arts. AMICAL runs Q&A sessions for potential Small Grant applicants during the weeks preceding each application deadline (next deadline: 3 November). Interested staff and faculty are encouraged to watch [AMICAL Connect](#) or the [AMICAL website](#) for the date of the next Q&A sessions.

WORKSHOP GRANTS: In July, a revised program supporting [consortium-wide workshops](#) was launched, with a stronger focus on library and technology leadership, information and digital literacies, and digital liberal arts. Workshops, which are generally proposed through AMICAL’s [member-led committees](#), are organized both as pre-AMICAL Conference events as well as separately, at other times during the year. The first of this year’s workshops will be announced together with the AMICAL Conference program in October.
