FACULTY ACTIVITY REPORTS FOR 2024: FAR reporting remains an important moment to reflect upon your teaching, your university service and your professional activity, whether this is scholarly research or practice based. **FARs are due to your chairs by the 15th of March, and then due back to the Provost's Office 6th of May**, when everyone has had their FAR review with their department chair. We continue to prefill the accord service annexes based on the records at our disposal. Every CDI faculty, who is an accord adherent, simply needs to review the information and, if modifications are required, please insert the information into your FAR and we will review and respond back over the summer.

HIRING REQUESTS (2025-2026): As we prepare for the 2025-26 budget, department chairs are requested to submit their hiring requests for both CDI and CDD positions for next year by March 1st. REMINDER:

- **CDD CLASS VISITS SPRING 2025:** Remember to plan for the class visits of our new CDD colleagues. As per the faculty manual they should be conducted in the beginning of the semester.

SSO (SINGLE SIGN ON) FORMSTACK: As part of improved IT security, AUP updated Formstack as of 31 January to use single sign-on via AUP NetID, rather than using a separate login and password as has been required.

Faculty and staff who review student academic forms (approving or denying specific steps) may still access the forms via the email links in the same manner as before. However, they now also have the option instead to log into Formstack with their AUP NetID. Logging in with personal NetID will allow users to see a dashboard of all forms pending their review, grouped by form type. The Registrar's Office is also working to include the student's name on each form for easier navigation.

Individual accounts have been created for administrative users who build and manage forms so that moving forward, each user can access Formstack via their AUP email address. We are working to update user access and permissions in the coming weeks.

ELECTRONIC DIPLOMAS: Last year, we successfully moved to the adoption of electronic diplomas provided by Parchment. AUP graduates now receive not only a paper AUP diploma as before but also have access to a digital blue-ribbon certified diploma. Additionally, we have begun using DocuSign for our RNCP certificates, so we now offer students a digital version.

THE GRADUATE PROGRAMS' OFFICE

The Graduate Programs Office is in the process of hiring a new Graduate Student Support Coordinator to replace Tara Raye Myer who is now an Admissions & Recruitment Counselor - Graduate Focus.

ACE: CENTER FOR ACADEMIC, CAREER AND EXPERIENTIAL ADVISING

NEW HIRE: ACE is delighted to welcome Loren Wolfe to the academic advising team. Loren has taught EN courses for us, and now is coming on full time in ACE where, after she has had time to settle in, she will be working with the

Department of Economics and Management as well as seconding Michelle Hwang with our First Year Abroad students.

REASSIGNING ADVISEES: Faculty advisors, please be aware that we are doing everything we can to reassign advisees who have requested a change or who have changed/declared majors before preregistration advising begins. As many of you are aware, this is a fraught and delicate task, so please be patient. We would like to be able to move the advisee's degree worksheet to the new advisor once the change has been made if the student has not changed majors, so do please ensure that your degree worksheets are uploaded to your Teams channel so that we can make the switch for you.

OFFICE OF INSTITUTIONAL RESEARCH, ASSESSMENT, AND EFFECTIVENESS

The IR Office has been working on revising and streamlining the processes of data collection, data storage, assessment, and reporting. We have redesigned the templates for syllabus, course assessment, and department report. We have requested a new license for the course evaluation system that we constantly encountered challenges with over the past year and will be able to improve the user experience shortly. We are also in close collaboration with relevant units to develop KPIs and create policies and procedures that are required by the Middle States Accreditation but currently missing.

BLACK HISTORY MONTH: It is black history month on campus and, like every year, the Library is collaborating with the students to propose a set of books, films, podcasts in English and in French and more. For more information visit our [page!](#)

COLLECTION DEVELOPMENT POLICY: The library will be sharing this month its collection development policy, after approval from the AUP Leadership Team. The spirit of this new policy is to host a living and dynamic print collection, something less permanent, but always in support of the current teaching and learning needs of the AUP community. The policy will be the framework of the types of physical collections that will be stored in the Quai and the further development of the already rich and strong collections of online resources.

- **THE 3RD FESTIVAL DE BD:** Professors Caroline Laurent and Franck Andrianarivo and the library team are coordinating this spring's third festival of BD. This year's topic will be around the African graphic novels. We are bringing two exciting authors and bedistes to campus.
- **WRITING LAB PEER TRAINING:** Through Ann Mott's and Michael Stoepel's initiatives, the library has been involved in the Writing Lab peer tutors' training at the graduate and undergraduate level. The goal of this collaboration is to strengthen the tutors' awareness of research, existing resources and issues around academic honesty.
- **LIBRARY SPOTLIGHTS THE SCHAEFFER CENTER:** The Library opened a space in its web page to feature the Library Spotlight. This time we are featuring the **Schaeffer Center Spring Fellowships**. Students applying to the fellowships can reinforce their applications to the Center by working with librarians on their research skills and their awareness of the available resources that support their fellowship. ACADEMIC RESEARCH CENTER (ARC)

ARC PEER TUTORING: The ARC tutors have started holding office hours this spring semester as of January 20th, 2025. Peer tutors are students who have previously excelled in their courses. They are here to help their peers with questions regarding their homework assignments and with reviewing course content before exams. These services are free of charge, and they are walk-in-based. Students can come to the 4th floor of the Quai Building at any time when a peer tutor for the subject they would like help on is present. ACADEMIC ACCOMMODATIONS: Students with recognized disabilities can register their need for academic accommodations through our office. Students with accommodations are responsible for sending their professors the official letter detailing their accommodations. ACADEMIC ACCOMMODATION WORKSHOPS: This semester, we are happy to announce we are offering workshops designed to support faculty navigating accommodations in their classrooms. We hosted our first Accommodations workshop of the semester: Accommodations: How They Work and Why We Need Them on Tuesday, January 28th. For those that couldn't make it, **we will host another workshop: Universal Design: Accessibility in the Classroom on Tuesday February 18th 12:30 – 13:30 in Q-609.** Bring your lunch and any questions about accommodations, we hope to see you then!

WRITING LAB: Every writer needs a reader, and AUP's Writing Lab is here to support our students -- from first year to graduate – across the disciplines and at all stages of the writing process. This term we are open from 10 – 18h, Monday through Friday, and our teams of undergrad and grad tutors are eager to work with you and your students. If you have not mentioned the Writing Lab on your course syllabus, please do so in relation to specific writing assignments.

In the coming weeks we will host several Combes lobby events, offer research workshops, and continue with our popular LNAPs (Late Night Against Procrastination) and Pizza and Papers evenings in the Quai.

We're happy to visit your class to make a brief presentation about our services. Or we can work with you to tailor in-class writing workshops. If you would like a WL tutor to visit your class at any point during the semester, please contact us. Your students are more likely to visit the Writing Lab after a tutor has made a presentation about our services, and we would be more than happy to tailor our presentations to fit your writing assignment.
